The public hung up dog tags from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday. A cookout and closing ceremony with music capped the day, which included a visit from South Carolina Department of Veterans' Affairs director of operations David Rozelle.

"It's as amazing as I expected it to be," Rozelle said of the barn. "Tom is a perfectionist."

Rozelle, who served 27 years in the U.S. Army and was injured in the Iraq invasion, did tours as an amputee. His job for the state is to, among other things, connect veterans with needed resources.

Veterans of the Korean, Vietnam, Cold, Gulf and Afghanistan wars made it to Central on Monday, von Kaenel said. The next event at the barn is scheduled for June 12, which is Women Veterans Day.
